Did you know ...?

WORKING TOGETHER TO IMPROVE SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

- Good attendance at school is essential for children to get the most out of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing and wider life chances.
- Nurseries and first schools play a vital role in embedding good attendance habits.
- Even at first school, children with the highest attendance have higher rates of attainment.
- National data shows us that children not meeting the expected standard in reading, writing and maths.
- For the most vulnerable pupils, regular attendance is also an important protective factor and the best opportunity for children's needs to be identified and support provided.
 Research has shown there are clear links between regular absence from school and harm to children.
- 95% attendance = two weeks absence
- · 90% attendance = 4 weeks absence
- · 85% attendance = 6 weeks absence
- · 80% attendance = more than half a term of absence
- · 75% attendance = more than 9 weeks of absence

Please remember that I am unable to authorise absences during term time for family holidays. We would be grateful if parents/carers could also inform grandparents, family and friends, who may be looking to book birthday or Christmas trips away, that these do not fall under exceptional circumstances and will not be authorised.

If you need any support regarding attendance, please do not hesitate to come and speak to us as we can help you access support from the school nurse, attendance officer or other appropriate services.

We recognise that children may sometimes have a legitimate reason to be absent from school, and we are also aware that some families face difficulties which may impact on their child's education, therefore, the traffic light system has been put in place to support families by highlighting concerns at an early stage.

We hope that you will continue to support our school by promoting school attendance and by informing us if you feel there are any issues that are preventing your child from attending school regularly.



CHILDREN IN NEED

On Friday 14th November, children are invited to come to school in something spotty to support Children in Need.

There are so many issues deeply affecting children and young people in the UK today. Mental health struggles, rising levels of poverty, the ongoing pressures of social inequality and the negative impact of family challenges can all present massive barriers to a healthy childhood. This year's campaign, titled "Challenge Yourself," encourages people to take on a sponsored challenge, such as doing "25" of something, to raise money for vital projects supporting disadvantaged children and young people.

In school, children will be undertaking the following challenges:

Nursery - Create and perform a dance with 25 moves

Reception - 25 circuits on the climbing equipment

Year 1 - 25 acts of kindness throughout the day

Year 2 - 25 lengths of the yard in different movement patterns

Year 3 - 25 minutes of silence

Year 4 - 25 laps of the school field throughout the day

Free Talk at All Saints Church, Gosforth, NE3 4ES 3.00- – 4.30pm Saturday 8th November




We all meet neurodivergence in our lives. We'll be interested to hear from you for this talk followed by discussion, exchanges of views & experience.

READING BOOKS

As you know, we use Read Write Inc. (RWI) as our phonics scheme. Children are assessed at the end of each half term to check the progress they have made and group children for the following half term. Using the RWI programme, reading books are matched to the sounds children know. These "Bookbag Books" and e-books are sent home with children during the reading cycle and are changed in line with the scheme (some cycles last 3 days, others last 5 days).

Recent research shows that children who can read well at age seven do better academically as teenagers. Children learn to read better, the more one-to-one support they get. As outlined in our reading workshops for parents and carers, our aim is to raise our children to be avid and able readers. Parents play a key role in 'raising readers' by supporting their children's reading journey by putting aside a few minutes each day. We ask that you try to listen to your child read their schoolbook aloud, every night, if they can manage it or, if they are tired, for five minutes in the morning. (Everyone tends to be much fresher and willing first thing!)

Once children have completed the RWI phonics programme, they will access Accelerated Reader books where they can choose from a wide range of 'real' books that are closely matched to their reading ability. These books motivate children to read often, engage in reading quizzes, at school, linked to the book they are reading and offers personalised recommendations based on children's previous choices. As children read more widely, they develop greater reading stamina, word recognition and language comprehension skills.

Reading aloud has many benefits to children. They are more likely pay close attention to every word on the page. This leads to a better understanding of what they are reading. Research also shows that reading aloud makes it easier to remember words than if you read them silently. This is key for young readers who are building their vocabulary. Reading aloud also helps students build their reading speed, allowing them to read longer text and allows us, as adults, to check they are pronouncing words correctly, emphasising the right words/phrases and using intonation appropriately.



READING FOR PLEASURE

As well as learning the mechanics of reading, it is important for children to read for pleasure. As such, our children who are on the RWI phonics programme also bring home a 'Reading for Pleasure' book to share with an adult. They will choose this book from their classroom library. This book is intended to be *read to your child by an adult*, not by your child. You do not, therefore, need to record when you have read this book to your child in their reading record.

Reading to your child is a great way to extend their vocabulary, build their language and thinking skills (as well as being a special time for connecting with your child). Regular, consistent reading can increase your child's vocabulary and a strong vocabulary often leads to a higher level of academic success.

This week in school, we have continued our learning about climate change and the Church of England's pledge for Net Zero Carbon in schools by 2030 and have linked this with careers. On Thursday the 6th of November, we had two visitors in school from the local community who discussed with the children their career pathway and how their work incorporates sustainability. We first welcomed Peter Rhodes who works for Kromek and has forged his own path within the company to become Head of Sustainability. Peter worked with the Year 3 and Year 4 children to discuss carbon priorities and how they can make small changes that will have a big impact on reducing their carbon.

We then welcomed Dr Olli Jones who works for Cundall and has progressed into the role of Director of Sustainability and Innovation. Olli worked with our Year 1 and Year 2 pupils and discussed how the materials we use to build can be paramount to the success of the project and it's carbon footprint.

Our children and staff found both of these workshops extremely interesting and eye-opening and we would like to thank both men for their time and effort.

Our school will also be looking for volunteers during STEM week in early March 2026. It will run from March 6th - 15th and be focused on the following title 'Curiosity - what's your question?'. Mrs Massey, Mrs Francis, Mrs Crozier and Mrs Ellwood are our school's Designated Safeguarding Leaders (DSLs). Mr Brown is DSL for Wraparound care. Children are regularly reminded who they can talk to if they are worried about something in school.

If you have concerns about a child, please contact one of us. If it is an emergency and a child is in immediate danger, please call the police. Members of the public can also report concerns to Children's Social Care directly. If you have a concern about a child please contact one of the following:

E-SAFETY - SHARENTING

Posting pictures of children online, a practice known as "sharenting," can pose some significant risks to children's safety and privacy.

Once an image is uploaded, control is lost - the image can be copied, saved and shared by anyone, making it impossible to fully delete from the internet. This creates a permanent digital footprint for a child before they are old enough to consent. We are sad to say that there has been a recent case where one of our families in school has had an image of their child misused.

Misuse may not be immediate - it may be years later and can be in a range of forms e.g. for cyberbullying, identity theft or exploitation. Criminals can use photos and personal information to create fake social media accounts, steal a child's identity or use artificial intelligence to generate harmful, fabricated imagery.

Please be aware that photos can also give away information like location via metadata or other details like a child's school, from visual cues, making them vulnerable to real-world predators too.

Please be cautious: consider your privacy settings and think carefully about the lasting consequences of sharing your child's private moments publicly.
