

Pupil Premium Spending 2016-17

At Archbishop Runcie CE First School endeavor to support every individual in every way we can help them reach their full potential.

The aim of the Pupil Premium money is to support our disadvantaged children and to ensure we work closely with families to remove any barriers to these pupils achieving as highly as other groups.

Purpose of Pupil Premium

The pupil premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to schools to work with pupils who have been registered for free school meals at any point in the last six years (known as 'Ever 6 FSM'). Schools also received funding for children who had been looked after by a Local Authority continuously for more than six months, and children of service personnel. In April 2014 funding was made available for children who have been adopted or have guardians. The Pupil Premium is additional funding given to schools so that they can support their disadvantaged pupils and close the attainment gap between them and their peers. Introduced in April 2011, Pupil Premium funding rose to £1.875 billion in 2013-14, with schools attracting £900 per disadvantaged child, with an additional payment of £53 for primary-aged pupils. In 2014-15, the funding rose to £2.5 billion, with £1300 for primary-aged pupils, £935 for secondary-aged pupils, £1900 for all looked after children, adopted children and children with guardians and £300 per child of Service Personnel. In addition, up to £300 is payable for 3 and 4 year olds whose parents are entitled to certain benefits.

In 2016-17 our allocation is £22,363 –impact is measured over the academic year

The government believes that head teachers and school leaders should decide how to use the pupil premium. They are held accountable for the decisions they make through:

- the performance of disadvantaged pupils compared with their peers
- the Ofsted inspection framework, under which inspectors focus on the attainment of pupil groups, and in particular those who attract the pupil premium
- the reports for parents that schools have to publish on their websites.
